







A comprehensive solution to the lack of affordable access to sufficient storybooks for early readers in familiar languages, by:


- Implementing an alternative open licence publishing model through African Storybook (ASb): www.africanstorybook.org;
- Enabling local agency through use of the website for translation, adaptation and creation of picture storybooks;
- ✓ Supporting **use of the storybooks** in a variety of formats and methods of delivery by individuals, communities, libraries, schools, teacher education institutions, and government departments;
- Creating ASb Reader and Maker Apps for offline story reading and creation, respectively.



- A sufficient supply of lively and relevant storybooks in familiar languages as well as encouragement of their **imaginative use with children** is vital for the development of the habit of reading.
- Together with **formal reading instruction** in schools, can break the cycle of illiteracy leading to improved levels of literacy necessary for African children in the 21st century.
- Collaboration with a range of other literacy players in the field that **uphold open learning principles including OERs**, such as:
 - ✓ **National or provincial** education ministries/departments for systemic uptake; Local and national literacy initiatives, particularly, those with technology platforms and/or who supply devices;
 - ✓ International literacy partners to encourage use of ASb storybooks globally; ✓ Individual **Champions** who are supported to work closely with their communities and children.



- The Ulwazi Lwethu (2020 2023) collection is the largest publishing project undertaken by African Storybook
- It allowed a wide range of storybooks to be originated in the 9 official African languages of South Africa leading to **736 picture storybooks**






